Did you know that you can borrow and download hundreds of books and movies that will help you increase your understanding of the Catholic faith from Baltimore's own Enoch Pratt Free Library? Did you know that you can reserve books on-line and pick them up at the branch library most convenient for you?

Catholicism 101

First, you need an Enoch Pratt Library card. If you don't have one, you can register on-line for a Pratt eCard using the QR code to the left and have instant access eBooks, audio books, movies, and other media. Second, you will need to download the Libby and Hoopla Digital apps from the Apple App Store or Google Play for Android using the QR codes to the left.

With your Pratt Library card or eCard you can request these and other books at your local branch library, or download the books

from either Libby or Hoopla if available digitally. Can't find the book you want in the Pratt Library system? Use the Marina interlibrary loan system to borrow books from across the state and nation. Baltimore City residents who



April 16 – Saint Bernadette Soubirous (1844-1879). Beheld Blessed Virgin at Lourdes.



April 17 – Saint Benedict Joseph Labre (1748-1783). "Beggar of Rome" shared his food with poor.



April 18 – Blessed James Oldo (1364-1404). Franciscan priest cared for sick and POWs.



April 19 - Saint Gianna Beretta Molla (1922 – 1962). Pediatrician, wife, mother and a saint!



April 20 – Saint Conrad of Parzham (1818-1894). Capuchin Friar aided neglected children.



April 21 – Saint Anselm (1033-1109). Archbishop of Canterbury and "Father of Scholasticism."



April 22 – Saint Adalbert of Prague (956-977). Exiled Bishop of Prague and martyr.
